Step of the Month: Step 7 Experience

"We humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings."

I got clean at 17 years old. I have been clean for 16+ years. I was lost without Narcotics Anonymous. I truly believe if it wasn't for Narcotics Anonymous I'd still be dead. The fellowship got me clean, supported me when I had no one, loved me when I didn't know what love was; taught me friendship, taught me how to laugh again, taught me how to have fun and live in the moment. When I got clean, I couldn't imagine my life without drugs. It was my whole identity. It wasn't just a social crutch, it was my lifeline. I needed drugs to survive, but I also loved them. And now just the drugs but drug culture, the buying, the selling, the chase, the scamming-chaos, constant chaos.

Everyone said the 4th step separated the men from boys, the women from the girls! I was dead set on doing it right. In fact, I did two 4th steps. Just to be sure! The 5th step got me closer with my sponsor. After step 5 we were bonded for life! I felt like I had been through the fire, IRON SHARPENS IRON! I had been through the hard part. My first few months in recovery were horrible, I hated myself, I wanted to die, I didn't think I'd make it, everyday was hell. But I made it! I didn't give up. And now I was done with step 4 and 5. I was ready to start meditating. I was ready to have fun, start sponsoring guys, preaching the NA gospel, speaking at conventions, you know, the fun stuff!

But then... then I got to step 6. Steps 4 & 5 didn't separate the men from the boys, women from the girls. Steps 6 & 7 did. Step 6 kicked my butt. I was losing it all over again. I thought I was the messiah. The 2nd coming of Jimmy K. Continues on Page 3



I was going all over town, speaking, sharing my story, yelling at the top of my lungs about the miracle of Narcotics Anonymous. I thought the rest of the steps were going to pat me on the back but step 6 punched me in the stomach.

Any man can talk about the dirt they did when they were using. Hell, half of brag about it for hours in the parking lot every night after the meeting. And for some people the 4th step can be very freeing, letting out their secrets they thought they would take to the grave. However! Step 6 is about the stuff I'm still doing. I remember hearing someone at a meeting say, "I told my sponsor I don't got any character defects- and my sponsor looked back at me and said 'that's one right there." I laughed so hard. It really be like that sometimes.

In step 6, I realized I wasn't no damn messiah. I was still lying and manipulating. Maybe not for drugs, but for other things, to get girls, to get people to like me. I was still craving love and attention. Maybe I wouldn't tell blatant lies. But I was exaggerating and leaving things out. I was always on defense.

Also on my 6th step my sponsor asked if I wanted to go to a meeting with him and I told him "yea let me know" and he said "I am letting you know. You wanna go or not? You can say no, you don't gotta people please"... people please. What a concept. That's what I always did. I never said no. I was always vague. I never had real opinions. I was just a chameleon. Step 6 was a reality check. I wasn't saved. I wasn't cured. I was just as sick as ever. Using the program like a drug. High off attention and being right. Drunk off being liked.

Step 7 was my landing gear. I needed to come back down to earth. I also had to put the bat down. We learn that when we first come in. But I don't care how long you got clean, putting the bat down is a constant battle. Continues on Page 4



Step 6 is about awareness. I became aware of my humanness! Not my faults. My humanness. I'm human. I heard a woman say once at a meeting. Humility isn't thinking less of myself but thinking of myself less. What a concept!

Step 6 showed me the lines on the highway. Too far this way. Too far that way. I heard a guy in NA say, "Yeah you can be honest but sometimes people use that as an excuse to be an a-hole. Honesty without compassion is brutality, and being brutally honest is just being an a-hole." I got lost in that too. Being a jerk off and covering it up with some spiritual principle.

In step 7 I learned how not to go too far one way or another. They say God lives in the middle. I wanna be in the middle. When I'm in the middle, I don't have any chaos. We all know those people who "just happen" to be in all the drama. Maybe they want to live like that, I don't. I've come to enjoy my peace of mind. In step 7 I learn that focusing on stopping the defect is like focusing on stopping using. I gotta focus on something else. I always say you can't rip a toy out a pitbulls boys. You gotta give it a steak, give it something juicer and then it'll let go. That's what step 7 was for me. Instead of focusing on not lying, I focused on telling the truth. I read somewhere that there's an actual science to it. Our brains don't respond to "no and not" sentences. We don't learn from "don't hold your fork like that." We learn from "hold your fork like this."

At the end of the day, Step 7 taught me not to judge so much. And if I'm going to judge, judge SLOWLY. Judge very very slowly. The longer I stay clean the more and more I realize it's not about who got the most NA gold stars but who's got the attendance. Just keep coming. I started telling the truth. The whole truth.

Tradition of the Month: Tradition 7

"Every NA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions."

The seventh tradition is, arguably, the most well-known of our traditions. Consider this, no matter the meeting format or what readings are chosen by the group, not a meeting goes by without the reciting of this very important tradition. As the basket circulates around the room, the newcomer finds out for the first time, and the old-timer is reminded for the umpteenth time, that we are supporting ourselves. We, the Narcotics Anonymous groups, are paying our own way.

When I was in my active addiction, I was a taker. I took from strangers, family, and friends to support my diseased lifestyle. Any chance I got to have someone else pay the bill, I took. I knew it was wrong, but my need to get high overrode my scruples. In recovery, I have learned that paying my own way isn't just the right thing to do, it is also part of my path to freedom. The guilt and shame of taking from others has been replaced by feelings of pride and self-sufficiency.

Likewise, when an NA group struggles to pay its bills but adjusts and keeps its doors open for the addict in need of help, a sense of community builds among the members. Accepting outside donations, be they from an organization or an individual, can beholden the group to that charitable giver. If the group has to consider the donors' wishes, then adherence to the traditions takes a back seat.

In the real world, some meetings must close because they are not able to pay their bills. While this is unfortunate, it is better to lose one meeting than to open the door to compromising the traditions that keep this fellowship alive and free. After all, "we keep what we have only with vigilance, and just as freedom for the individual comes from the twelve steps, so freedom for the group springs from our traditions."

Concept of the Month: Concept 7

"All members of a service body bear substantial responsibility for that body's decisions and should be allowed to fully participate in its decision-making processes. ."

"The Seventh Concept is one way of putting the principle of group conscience to work in the service environment. This concept suggests that each service body should encourage all its members to participate in its decision-making process. By bringing their different perspectives together, we give our service bodies the opportunity to develop a fully informed, balanced group conscience leading to sound, sensitive service decisions.

Our service boards and committees represent a cross-section of NA perspective and experience. Each participant's contribution to the decision-making process is important. Determining participation at the group level is fairly simple: if you're a group member, you may fully participate in the group's decision-making process. Determining participation in the decision-making processes of most service boards and committees is a little more involved, yet the same basic principles still apply. Freely expressed individual conscience is the essential element in group conscience at any level.

NA service is a team effort. Our service representatives are responsible to the NA Fellowship as a whole rather than any special constituency; so are all the other trusted servants on the team. The full participation of each member of the team is of great value as we seek to express the collective conscience of the whole. " Continues on Page 7



"There is no firm rule about how to apply the concept of participation to every situation. In an atmosphere of love, mutual respect, and frank, open discussion, each service body decides these things for itself. In significant matters affecting the groups, a service body will want to ask for guidance directly from the groups. In the vast majority of cases, however, the service body will exercise its delegated authority in fulfilling the responsibilities the groups have assigned to it, disposing of the matters in the normal course of its service meetings.

NA's principle of spiritual anonymity is the foundation for the Seventh Concept. This principle points our fellowship toward a leveling of the individual's relative importance as a participant in NA service. The Seventh Concept, with its emphasis on equalizing the relative weight of each voice on the team, puts the spiritual principle of anonymity into practice. Though we may not all participate in every decision made in our fellowship, we all have the right to participate fully and equally in the decision-making processes in the service bodies in which we are members."

A Member's Personal Experience

It took me about 8-9 months to settle down in my seat. My first few months, it was up and down, up and down. I was so emotional. I'd cry for no reason. I had constant drug dreams. I didn't have any friends. I felt so alone. I'd see people at meetings laughing and hugging and I'd think to myself "I'll never have that".

I felt anxious all the time. I couldn't sleep. Everyday was a battle to not kill myself. But eventually everything must come to an end, even the bad times. One day I woke up. And it was like I just snapped out of it. I was in a good mood. It was odd. I remember trying not to be too excited because it wouldn't last ... but it did last. I felt pretty good, even, yea even, that's the word, I felt like I was finally even. I could breathe. I could relax a little. I had things to look forward to. I started to make friends. I started making plans. Eventually I started to build a little life. I got a steady job, I fixed up my room the way I like it. I had a little car. I had a schedule! I went to work on these days. I went to meetings every single night, but I chaired on these nights, on this day my friend was speaking. I woke up early and hit the gym, on the weekend I'd go to spin class, sometimes I'd wake up early and jog on the beach. I had a little movie collection. When I went to meetings people remembered my name, on the rare occasion I didn't make a meeting, people called me and checked in on me.

Then I got a year clean. God was that something. A whole year. But I wasn't just clean. No. Being abstinent was for suckers. I was hard core! I worked steps, I went to meetings every night, I talked to the new comer, I read all the IPs, I listened to over 100 speaker tapes! I was on fire for narcotics anonymous! I bled basic text blue. I went from being skeptical to being the cult leader. And yea! I didn't care if you called it a cult, you can call it magic, call It brain washing, but what ever it was, it was working! I thought I had built up my self confidence. I was going on dates, had friends, was in the gym everyday, but I hadn't built up anything but my ego. I still didn't look myself in the mirror. I worked out constantly, but still thought I was ugly. No matter how much I worked out, it was never enough. I was still a shaky insecure boy, just wanting everyone to like him....

A few things happened to me when I was on step 6. I was scrolling through social media and saw this girl post something that said "I don't work out because I hate my body, I work out because I love my body." It hit me. I was smiling. Wow, I work out because I hate my body. But it's started to get the wheels turning. My sponsor had me do positive affirmations in the mirror. I had to do 7 physical compliments and 7 non-physical compliments. It was hard. It was weird. I could barely think of 2 physical things I liked about myself. But eventually I did it. I did it everyday. And then one day I pulled out my drivers license for something and I thought "damn that's a good picture of me." I had hated this picture since I got it taken. My nose was too big, I looked ugly. That's what I would think. But after the affirmations I didn't see any of that. The picture didn't change but my perception did....




